Over 150 Maryland-Grown Wines from Across the State Competed for Prestigious Award

Boordy Vineyards Albariño 2015 earned the Governor's Cup Best in Show and Big Cork Vineyard's Black Cap NV was awarded the Jack Aellen Cup Winner, a new award this year. The Jack Aellen Cup is new to the competition this year and specifically highlights fruit wine, cider and mead. The cup is named after Linganore Winecellars founder, Jack Aellen, who pioneered wines from fruit and honey in Maryland. The inaugural "Jack Aellen Cup" will be presented annually alongside the Governor's Cup.

"I was very pleased to see that all of our wines were so highly regarded by the judges. It's an honor to receive the Jack Aellen Cup - I lift a toast to Mr. Aellen, who was such a bold pioneer in the early years of Maryland Winemaking," said Dave Collins, Winemaker for Big Cork Vineyards.
